Course Description	<p>This course introduces students to a variety of digital media communication and storytelling technologies and techniques, including image and sound capturing and manipulation, Internet-based publishing and research, digitizing, editing, and curating/archiving material. Design and management tasks involved in communicating using digital media are also introduced, including audio and video editing and processing using software on computers and/or phone technology, data integrity management, file structuring and packaging, and work presentation. The goal is to engage students and inspire them to examine cultural and community-based stories as they appear in digital forms, as well as personal expressions, through textual, voice, and visual narratives, using digital tools that are often readily available to us, such as mobile technologies, cameras, computers, and apps/software.</p>

Content	<p>Core topics – all of the following will be covered:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Digital storytelling, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Its history and practice across various contexts ○ Presentation in various genres and platforms ○ Positionality and audience ○ Visualization ○ Sound ○ Storyboarding and scripting ○ Identifying, explaining, collecting, curating, and preparing your materials ○ Story editing, revisions, and uploading ○ Principles of website design: dos and don'ts, and etiquettes of web design, “Look and feel” and user interface ○ Decolonizing stories and the web • Hands-on development of a functional, multi-page website, which does not require prior knowledge of HTML or web design, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Use of social media, including filming short video clips, audio recording, embedding and editing using Final CutPro, Davinci Resolve or other programs ○ Graphic design using Adobe Photoshop, Gimp or other programs ○ Photography using cameras and cell phones ○ Website design using WordPress or a similar package, HTML (Hypertext Markup Language), Javascript, CSS (Cascading Style Sheets), Webservers, Network Basics ○ Enhancing web pages with the use of page layout techniques, text formatting, graphics, images, and multimedia ○ Students will complete a web-based major term project, such as a website for a small business or community group, that includes the above components as an applied communications project. <p>Additional topics may also be covered at the discretion of the instructor:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Indigenous storytelling • JEDI (Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion) perspectives in research consent, design, and methods
Methods of Instruction	<p>Lectures, class debate and discussions, audiovisual presentations, small groups working in online platforms, regular reflective submissions, individual work on academic assignments.</p> <p>Labs</p> <p>In addition to the scheduled classes and tutorials (discussing the readings), we will have a weekly lab session (location to be determined) as a space to practice techniques, raise questions and concerns, and discuss course content with one another. There will be lab exercises that students need to complete either on Canvas or in class.</p>
