Course Description	Europe in the 20th Century is marked by tragedy and triumph, collapse and (re)construction. Students will examine the history of Europe between 1900-2000 as a period of competing ideologies—monarchism, communism, fascism, and liberal democracy—for hegemony in Europe and the world. In doing so, students will seek to understand not only why and when these ideologies were both successful and popular in particular contexts, but also how they brought radical change and destruction to the people of Europe. Drawing on primary source documents, students will survey Europe's path throughout the 20th Century, putting special emphasis on political, social, and economic themes.
