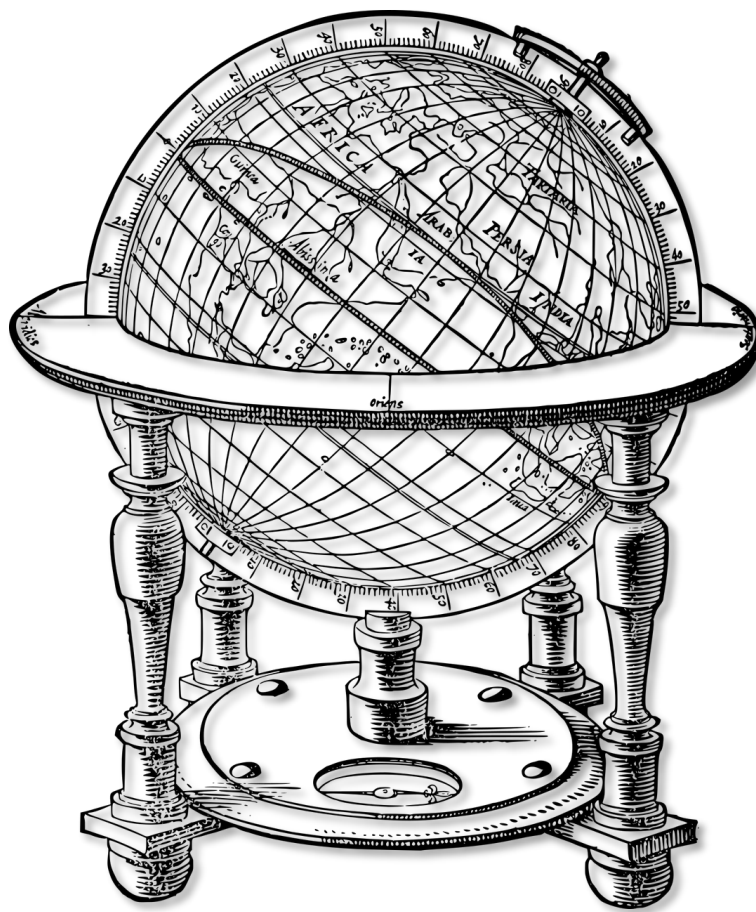

Welcome to CMS

This guide provides instructions and examples for citing sources in CMS style.

What is CMS?

CMS stands for Chicago Manual of Style, which is a style of writing common in History, Asia Studies, etc.

What is a footnote?

A footnote is a way to show where you found the information you are using in your work.

When do I have to use footnotes?

Every sentence with outside information (anything that is NOT your own thoughts or interpretations) should have a footnote at the bottom of the page, and a corresponding full-length entry on the “Bibliography” page at the end of your paper. Footnotes are linked to superscript numbers, which can be found inside of your paper to refer to the footnotes themselves.

Do I have to memorize the style guide?

No. Keep the style guide with you as you write and reference it when you have questions.

Glossary

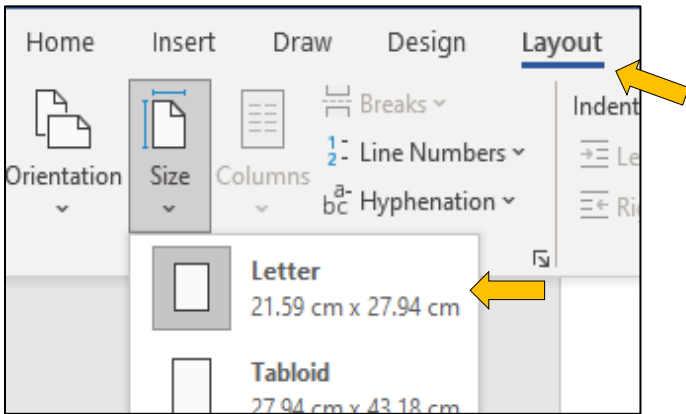
CMS	Chicago Manual of Style.
Footnote	A note with citation information in the footer of the page.
Superscript	A small number at the end of a word on the upper right side. In CMS, superscript numbers are used for footnotes.
Last Name	A family name or surname.
Stable URL/Permalink or DOI	A link that will stay consistent over time. A Digital Object Identifier (DOI) is a unique string used for online journals and academic articles.
et al.	Means “and others.” Used in cases of four or more authors.
Group Author	A company, association, organization, government department, or agency.
Accessed Date	The date that <i>you</i> read the source.
Inverted	Words placed in the opposite order, such as moving the last name to the front (last name, first name).
Indent	The 1.27 cm or 0.5-inch space from the margin on the first line of every paragraph and second line of every Works Cited entry.
Anthology	An edited collection featuring work by different authors.
Page Range	The first and last page numbers of an article or story. This is the section of a journal or book that you referenced.
Consecutive Citation	A sentence that needs a citation followed immediately by another sentence that needs a citation from the same source.
Indirect Citation	When you are using the ideas of one author written in another person's work. You will cite the author you are reading, NOT the one they are quoting.
Medium	The type of art or post. Examples include photo, video, etc.

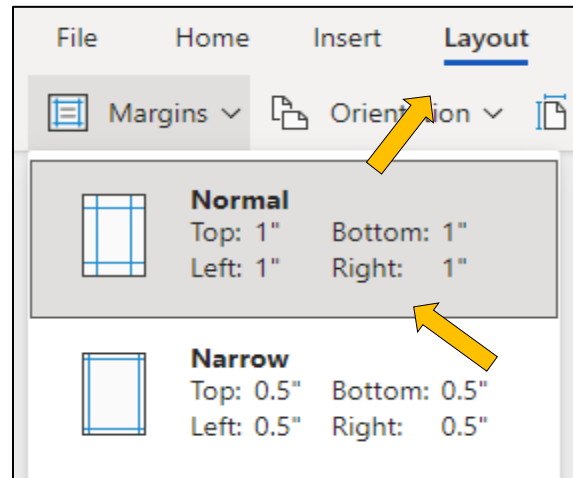

1-inch or 2.54 cm Margins

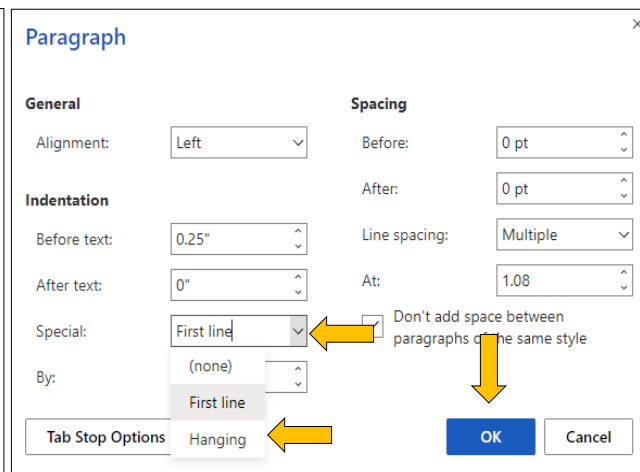
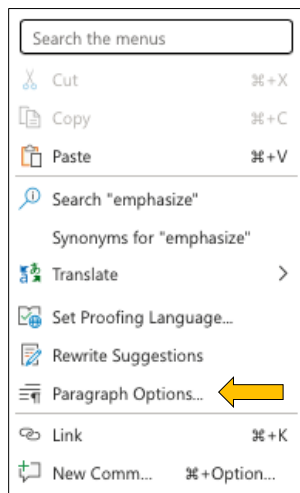


***NOTE:** Word documents, by default, are set to this format. Normally, students will not have to change the size and margins of their document.

First Line Indent and Hanging Indent

- Highlight Text.
- Right Click.
- Select "Paragraph."
- Select "First Line" or "Hanging."

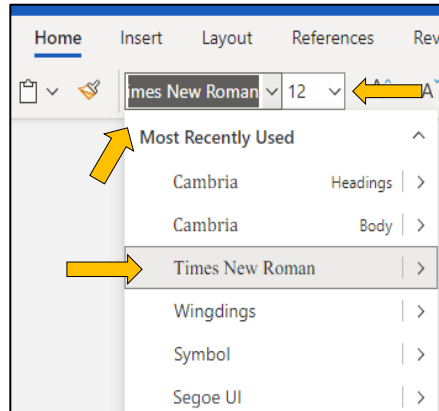
Hanging Indents are used for your Bibliography. The first line of each resource is formatted normally, but following lines of the same resource is indented inwards. Refer to "Footnote and Bibliography Examples" to see more.



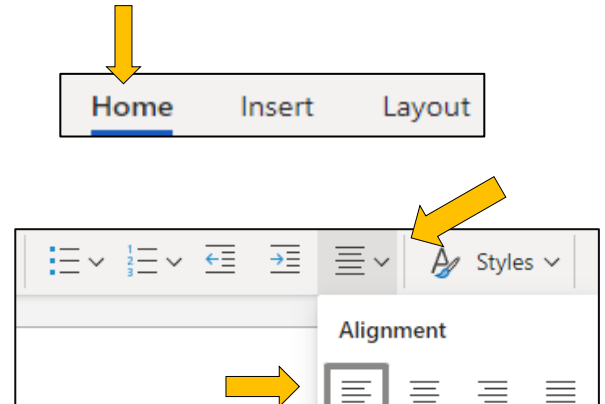

Header (Page Number)

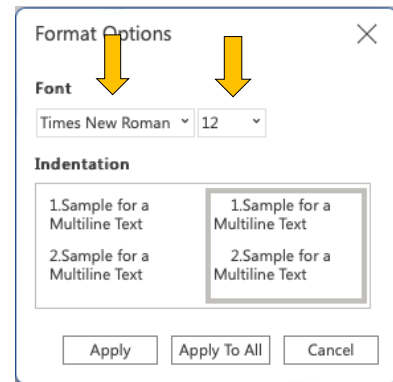
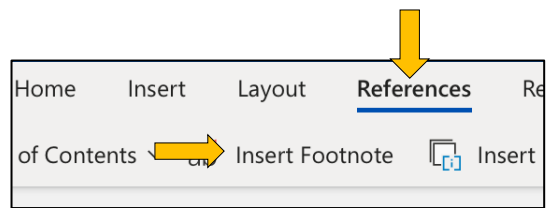
- Select "Insert" Tab.

Paper Formatting

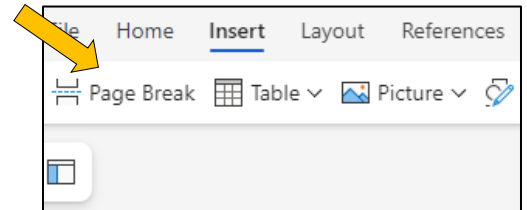
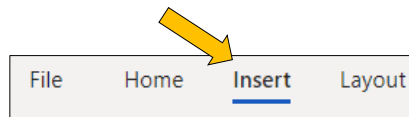
Superscript (Footnote)

- Select “Insert Footnote.”
- Type the footnote information in the pop-up box.
- Click “Format Footnote” to adjust font and size.
- Double-click the screen to exit.



Page Break Function

- Select “Insert” Tab.
- Select “Page Break.”

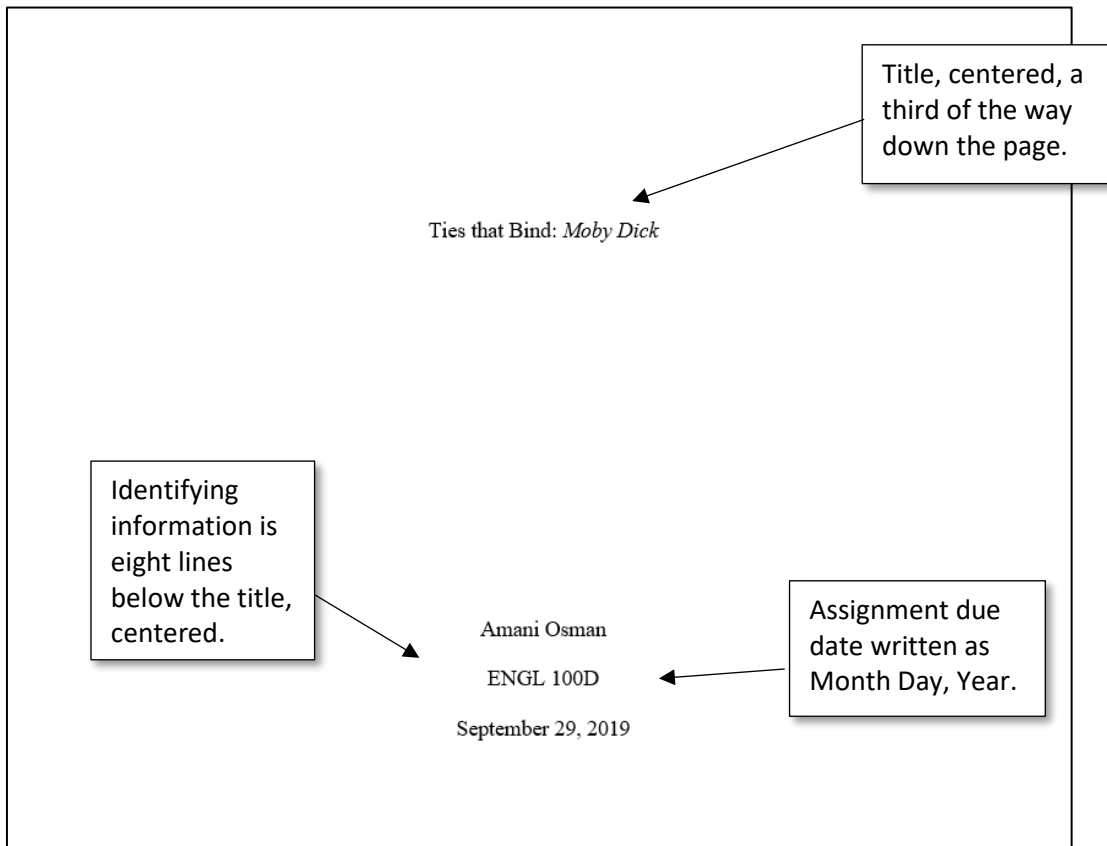


Insert a page break after your Title Page and before your Bibliography to create a new page. Page Breaks are used so the content of your assignments will not move as you continue to write.

Paper Formatting

Title Page

- Place the title a third of the way down the first page (about 4-5 lines double spaced).
- Put your name, course code, and the date eight lines down from the title, centered and double-spaced.
- Begin numbering the pages on the next page.



Footnotes

When you use information, ideas, or facts that come from a source, you need to include a citation. In the body of the essay, insert a superscript number at the end of every sentence that includes outside information. Place the source information in the footer section (the bottom of the page).

- **Direct quotations:** If you copy words from somewhere, you must include a citation. Use “quotation marks” to show that they are the author’s original words.
 - **Example:** The author claims “the number one cause of student stress before exams is poor time management.”¹
- **Paraphrases and Summaries:** When you take an idea, fact or opinion from a source and rewrite it in your own words, you must include a citation.
 - **Example:** The main reason students feel stressed before exams is that they don’t plan their time well.¹

Superscript Numbers and Footnotes

- Superscript numbers are used for footnotes. Do not use superscripts in the bibliography.
- Add a superscript number at the end of a sentence containing outside information after the period.
 - If the sentence contains a semi-colon, hyphen, or dash, a footnote may be placed mid-sentence if it applies to a specific part of that sentence.
- Ensure the information about the sources is in **the footer** section at the bottom of the page and not in-text.

Example of citations in CMS format:

In the article, author America Y. Guevara expressed that since 2006, the drug wars have been “claiming the lives of approximately 50,000 to 100,000 people”.¹ The cartel propaganda that has embedded in mainstream Mexico is partly to blame.²

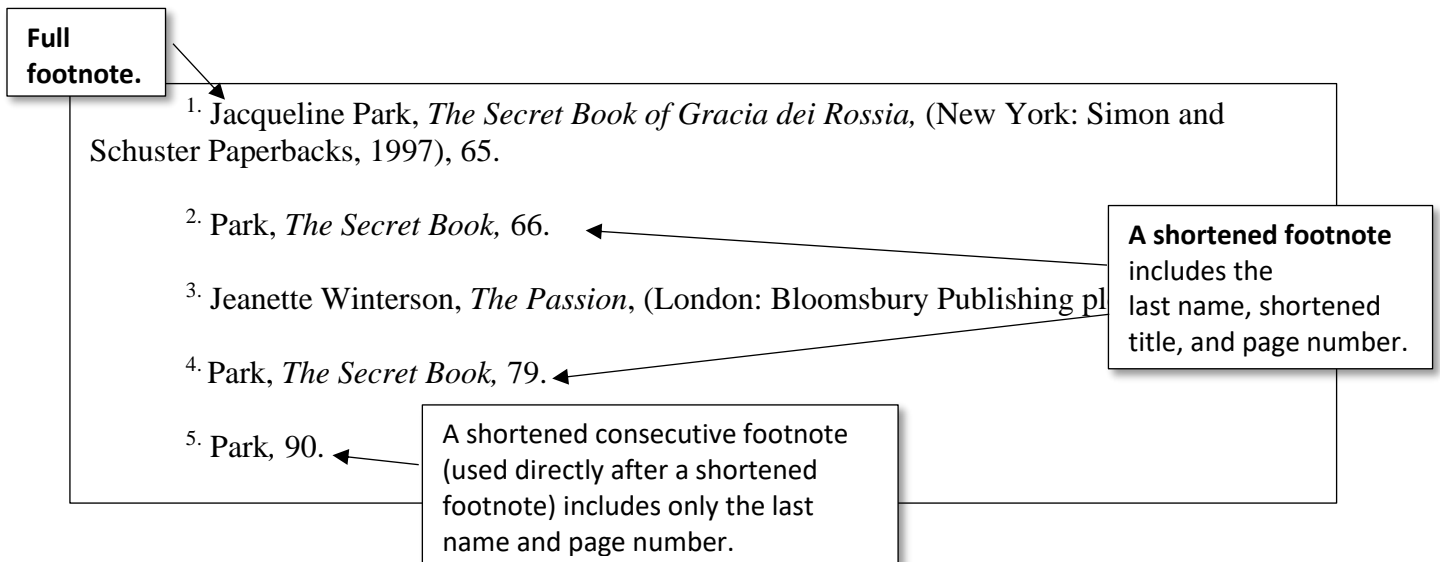
Superscript numbers

Consecutive Citations

- When citing the same source multiple times in a row, this is called a consecutive citation. Use shortened footnotes after the first full footnote.

First time: Full footnote information.	¹ S.R. Covey, <i>The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People: Restoring the Character Ethic</i> (New York: Anchor Books, 1989), 45.
Second time: Last name, shortened title, page number.	² Covey, <i>The Seven Habits</i> , 48.
Third time: Last name, page number.	³ Covey, 53.

- If the source does not have a page number, you can omit it.



Indirect Citations in CMS

An indirect citation is used when the author refers to another researcher in their work.

- In this instance, only cite the source where you found the quote.
- Make sure to include “Quoted in” before the footnote.

Author of book you read Maria Benedict

Title of book *Geopolitics in the Colonial Era*

Text from the book Leaders in this period regularly used propaganda “to sway the public toward the righteousness of their mission and spark the imaginations of rich investors.”²³

The original already has a footnote from another source.

Heroic and fantastic stories from abroad were important in raising money, as they “spark[ed] the imaginations of rich investors.”¹

Footnote for the source you read.

Add “Quoted in” at the beginning of the footnote.

Elements of CMS

- Footnotes are placed in the footer. Footnotes contain citation information for all sources used on a page.
- The Bibliography is a list of all the sources used throughout an assignment or academic paper on a separate page at the end.
- Footnote and Bibliography entries have a very specific format and organization. The following sections detail how each element of the footnotes and bibliography should appear.

Author's Name Format

Author's names are written differently in the Footnotes and Bibliography. Follow the examples in this table.

Authors		Example	Explanation
1 Author	Footnote	Matthew Dennis	Author's name is written as it appears on the work.
	Bibliography	Dennis, Matthew	Author's name is inverted.
2 Authors	Footnote	Neil Gaiman and Terry Pratchett	Author's names are written as they appear on the work.
	Bibliography	Gaiman, Neil, and Terry Pratchett	Invert the first author's name.
3 Authors	Footnote	Tenzin Doleck, Ena Lee, and Kumari Beck	Author's names are written as they appear on the work.
	Bibliography	Doleck, Tenzin, Ena Lee, and Kumari Beck	Invert the first author's name.
4 + Authors	Footnote	Stanley J. Shapiro et al.	Only write the first author's name followed by "et al." to represent the other authors.
	Bibliography	Shapiro, Stanley J., Kenneth Wong, William D. Perreault, and E. Jerome McCarthy	Invert the first author's name. Use this format for up to 10 authors. For more than 10 authors, use "et al." Use the word "and" before the last author's name.

Title Capitalization

- Titles are written by capitalizing the initial letter of all first, last, and major words.
 - Major words are content words: verbs, nouns, pronouns, adjectives, and adverbs.

Title on Source: The real world of teenage cyberbullying.

Title in the Bibliography: The Real World of Teenage Cyberbullying.



Accessed and Publication Dates

- Write any required dates in this order: **Month Day, Year.**
 - Example: December 12, 2014.

Last Revised and Last Updated

- Include the date when the source was “last updated” or “last revised” when available. Otherwise, use the “publication date.”

Footnotes & Bibliography

Sources Without Publication or Last Updated Dates

- If an online/web source **does not** have a publication date or a “last updated/revised” date:
 - Include “n.d.” and add an accessed date instead.
 - Accessed dates are written in the order of month, day, year.
 - Kabir, Joana. “The Psychology of Conflict.” *The Decision Lab*. n.d. Accessed November 15, 2021. <https://thedeclaration.com/thinkers/philosophy/sun-tzu>.

Publication Dates for Books

- Books only require the year of publication.

Publication Dates for Journal Articles

- Journal article dates can be written using the season.
 - Example: (Spring 2013)

DOI/URL

- When citing journal articles, include a DOI if it is provided. Otherwise, you may use a stable URL.
- For online sources, make sure to include a URL.
- Include “https://” for both.

Abbreviation Rules

- Only use abbreviations in the footnotes. Use the full word in the bibliography.

Edition	ed.
Edited by	ed.
Complied by	comp.
Translated by	trans.
Canadian edition	Cdn. ed.

Footnote and Bibliography Examples

- Use the Footnote/Bibliography Format as a template to organize the information of a Footnote/Bibliography entry.
- **Replace the information in the box with the source specific information.**
 - The content without a box should be written as is in the footnote/bibliography entry.
 - Replace all instances of # with the applicable number.
 - vol. # → vol. 8
