

# **English Placement Test Study Guide**

**Overview** The English Placement Test (EPT) evaluates language proficiency to place students in an appropriate English course. The test focuses on five areas: Listening, Vocabulary, Reading, Writing, and Speaking. The duration is 115 minutes.

- "Online shopping is replacing traditional retail. Discuss the advantages and disadvantages."

- "Plastic pollution is a growing problem. What steps can individuals and governments take to reduce it?"
- "Traffic congestion is a major issue in urban areas. What are the causes, and how can it be solved?"

- Share your opinion on whether public transportation should be free.

#### Describe a Situation:

- Describe an invention that has changed the world.
- o Talk about a memorable vacation and what made it special.
- Describe an old person you admire and why.

#### Discussion Questions:

- "Do advertisements influence people's buying decisions?"
- "Is advertising necessary in modern society?"
- "What are the advantages of living in a city compared to a rural area?"
